

Advanced Placement United States History

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Course Description

Advanced Placement United States History is designed to provide students with the analytical skills and factual knowledge necessary to deal critically with the problems and documents in United States history. Students engage in significant primary document research, analytical writing, and preparation for the AP U.S. history examination.

Course Goals

- Promote understanding of God's hand throughout history and how He was present through the history of our nation.
- Encourage deep thinking and an appreciation for the importance of history
- Seek mastery instead of memorization by analyzing the complex causes and effects of past events and examining the contributions of individuals and groups through a variety of perspectives.
- Allow students to engage with history by reading, analyzing, and responding to primary sources.
- Prepare students to take the AP US History Exam.

Mission Connection

LCCS exists to glorify God as a community of faith and learning dedicated to forming disciples of Jesus Christ, pursuing goodness, truth, and beauty, cultivating wisdom and virtue, and furthering the highest ideals and practices of human flourishing. This course supports the LCCS mission by demonstrating how God's hand is visible throughout all of history and by encouraging students to think deeply about historical events and their impact on their lives today.

Optional Materials: (these are required if you or your student is concerned about using shared materials. All shared materials are sanitized between uses.)

- Washable markers
- highlighter
- pair of scissors
- black permanent marker

Classroom Procedures

On the First Day of School

Please bring your own washable markers and scissors if you are concerned about using shared materials. Always bring at least one pen and one pencil to class. I will let the students know ahead of time if they need to bring other items. Having a highlighter and a permanent black marker can be helpful.

On our first day together, I will be going over this syllabus. If time allows, you will have time to start the student contact information sheet.

Starting the Day

Upon entering my class, students are expected to take their seats. They may chat with their neighbor until class begins. I will always signal that I am ready to start class by greeting my students while standing front and center in the classroom. At this point, I expect students to be attentively listening to any announcements and to share in a prayer with me to start our time together.

Dismissal

Once I am done with instruction, please check the list on the door to make sure you have done all that is required of you. You may not pack up your books until one minute before dismissal time. Always remain seated until I dismiss you. Lining up at the door is not permitted as it presents a significant safety hazard should an emergency arise as well as the unfortunate opportunity for bullying to occur out of my sight.

Notebooks

Please keep all papers I give you. You will need them for mid-terms, finals, and to review for the AP test. I recommend using a three-ring binder for this purpose but you are welcome to use whatever organizational system works best for you. Keeping your completed tests and quizzes is also a good idea as they will be very helpful when reviewing.

Personal Care

Hairbrushes, combs, makeup of any kind and any and all sprays and perfumes may not be used in my room. I will be particularly strict about sprays/perfumes because of potential allergies to ingredients or asthma. Please take care of these primping needs in the bathroom before class. Please do not play with the hair of the person in front of you.

Classroom Expectations (Student Learning Agreement)

God has created us each uniquely. He has also created us to worship Him with our efforts in everything that we do. Seeking to perform at the highest level of excellence is an act of worship to our Creator. As such, I agree to the following:

- I will be ON TIME for all classes every day.
 I understand that a total of three unexcused tardies to any and all of my classes will result in an immediate before or after-school detention.
- I will be PREPARED for class every day.
 I will have a writing utensil, paper, my textbook, and any other necessary resources for success in the classroom. Not being prepared for class may result in a deduction of points from my class participation grade.
- I will **COMPLETE** all assignments on time. I understand that late assignments will result in a deduction of 10% of the assignment grade *per day* that the assignment is late up to 50%. After 5 days, the grade becomes a zero for the assignment. Late work will not be accepted for credit but may still be required to be completed.
- I will **RESPECT** my instructor(s), any LCCS staff member, volunteer(s), classmates, and other students in other grades.
 Profanity, rude gestures, cruel teasing or put downs will not be tolerated. Such behavior(s) will first be addressed and managed by the instructor. If such behavior(s) continue students may be

• I will keep my **CELL PHONE OFF** and away at all times during the school day (8 am-3:10 pm). I understand that if my cell phone is visible or on, the instructor will confiscate the device and the Student Handbook Cell Phone Policy will be followed.

These expectations below are in addition to the Student Learning Agreement. Please consult both items in order to best understand what is expected of you and what you can expect from me.

Classroom Priorities

Consistently demonstrating these classroom priorities earns rewards for each class. All behaviors, good and bad, are a choice. Unfortunately, at times, students do make poor choices, which is why the process below is included in this syllabus.

Misbehavior

Discipline: To instruct and govern; to teach rules and practice, and accustom to order and subordination (Noah Webster 1828). Discipline is done in the classroom as necessary to maintain a safe, orderly and conducive-to-learning environment for all students. Students whose behavior is deemed by the teacher to be disrespectful and/or disruptive to the teaching and learning processes by any means will serve the following consequences:

- 1st offense verbal warning. (seating may be changed)
- 2nd offense The student will have a meeting with Mrs. Voran and parents will be contacted.
- 3rd offense The student will be given a detention and be referred to the Dean of Students.

Students removed from class due to disciplinary problems are responsible to acquire any missed work or notes.

Proverbs 12:1 "To learn, you must love discipline. It is stupid to hate correction" (See also Hebrews 12:11)

Miscellaneous Behavior Notes

- Stay awake during class Sleeping or putting your head down at any time will result in disciplinary action.
- Behave like the young adult that you are and keep all of your body parts to yourself and do not disturb anyone else's belongings.
- **No projectiles of any kind.** (eg: Throwing balled up paper at the trash can from across the room)
- If another teacher catches you doing my homework during their class, I will not count that work for any credit. If I catch you doing another teacher's work in my class, I will confiscate it and turn it in to the teacher for whatever grade they want to give the assignment. If another teacher catches you doing my work in their class, you will get a zero on that assignment.
- The only thing on your desk while I am teaching should be your notes sheet (clipped into your notebook is fine) and something to write with. Everything else should be on the floor or in the basket under your desk. Doing other things during class is not acceptable and you will receive consequences for it

Leaving During Class

You may only leave the classroom to use the restroom/get a drink etc. if you have asked me first and if I have given you permission. Passes are always required when leaving the room. Take the proper pass and sign out in the notebook before leaving. You may not go during the middle of a lesson/lecture or group activity. You may not go during an individual activity unless it is an emergency. Please try to do what you need to before you come to class. I value my time with you very highly and I ask that you respect our precious time together. If the pass you need is already in use, you may not leave the room. If you ask to use the restroom during class transition time, I will permit you to go without a pass and I will not count you late unless you arrive back more than 2 minutes after class begins. If you feel you may need longer to 'do your business' please discretely let me know. I will expect you back no more than 5 minutes after class begins. Any permitted breaks during class must be completed in approximately 8 or fewer minutes. Breaks between periods in our block of time should be completed between the bells.

If you do need to use the restroom or get a drink, please ask me for a pass. Write where you are going and the time you left the classroom on it and I will sign it.

Don't Bug Me! At times, we just need a time out to refocus ourselves. I understand this need and I want to give you as students an opportunity to use it. If you feel like there is a day that you just need to put your head down and not be expected participate in class, simply take the red "Don't Bug Me!" card and place it on your desk. (Once class begins, the card is no longer valid if it is not already placed on your desk.) Turn it in directly to me after you use it. (DO NOT place it on my desk.) Only one person may use it per class period and you may only use it once in a semester.

Academic Dishonesty: Academic dishonesty is better known as cheating or plagiarism, depending on how the assignment was completed. This is an unfortunate reality of being unprepared. If you are

prepared for class and attend class regularly, you will not have to worry about this. However, if you are caught cheating, plagiarizing or claiming someone else's work as your own, you will receive a zero on the assignment (no matter how large) and be referred to the office. To be more specific, cheating includes (but is not limited to):

- Failing to include citations or improperly citing someone else's work
- Copying someone else's work, changing the words to synonyms or only changing a few words in the sentence, and claiming it as your own work.
- Copying or knowingly allowing another to copy on any assignment;
- Talking, unnecessary noise making or motioning to anyone inside or outside the room during a test or quiz and/or
- Using the internet, your book or any other resources on take home assessments that are not open notes or using any resource other than your notes on open notes take home assessments.

Other instances may apply. We will review the school policy on this as well during the first week of school and at intervals throughout the year.

<u>Discipline</u>: To instruct and govern; to teach rules and practice, and accustom to order and subordination (Noah Webster 1828). Major Assignments AP Test on May 6, 2021

Homework

All assignments must be completed in pencil, black ink or be typed. **OUTLINES MUST BE TYPED.** Any assignment submitted in colored ink will lose 50% credit automatically. All assignments must be turned in on a full sheet of paper (no notecards, sticky notes, or cut pieces of paper unless I specifically ask for it.)

You will have four different types of assignments in this class. They are listed below. **Homework** – You may start this in class sometimes, but the bulk of it will be completed at home. This will be due the next day unless otherwise noted. I will assign homework 1-4 times per week. Homework will be graded on the scale below:

Full Credit - Complete and followed directions

Half Credit – More than half complete and followed directions

No Credit –Less than half complete and/or did not follow directions

Please see the section on late work for more information on penalties

Late homework will not be accepted for full credit unless you were absent from school for the entire day. If you miss my class for an appointment or any other reason that only removes you from school for part of the day, you still must submit your homework the day it is due. If you know you will be missing class for any other reason, please make arrangements with me to get work at least one school day in advance. (I require at least 5 days' notice for pre-planned absences longer than one day and 10 days' notice for absences longer than three days. Do not rely on the school office to notify me. You must do it yourself.)

If your homework doesn't have your name on it in the first quarter, I'll write "NAME?" on it in big letters and return it to you. No grade penalty in the first quarter. In the second quarter, you will lose 10% of the value of the homework assignment. If your homework doesn't have your name on it in the third marking period, you will lose ½ of the value of the homework assignment. If your homework assignment. If your homework is missing you name in the fourth quarter, you will receive a zero on the assignment. Keep this in mind! I will typically remind you to label your assignments before you turn them in.

If a teacher catches you doing my homework in their class, you will receive a zero. Home work should be done at home or in AWP.

Everything I give you will be graded in some way. It is always worth points.

If you are present when an assignment is given, it is due the day you return to school. If you are present when a test is announced, you will take it the day you return to school – extended absence will be taken into consideration IF you discuss it with me before you leave or immediately upon your return if you are absent due to illness.

Assessments

Tests/Quizzes– These will *mostly* be completed in class. They will typically cover only a single unit or chapter. If we did not cover a topic in class notes, homework or class work, do not expect it to be on the test unless I specifically tell you otherwise. They will have a variety of questions including multiple choice, true/false, fill in the blank, short answer and essay. They will always be announced. Talking/noise making during tests, even if you no longer have a test on your desk, will result in a zero. This is a zero tolerance policy. If your behavior continues after receipt of the zero, you will be referred to the office for cheating and defiance. See above for more information on what constitutes cheating. We will also sometimes have pretests before the start of a unit or chapter. These will be for a completion grade only. They are to help me evaluate your previous knowledge of the subjects we are about to cover. Please do not use your books, the internet, or other people to help with these pretests so I am able to get a true idea of your previous knowledge.

Test Retakes:

NEW IN 2020 – Because we are working for mastery and not memorization, I will allow you to retake **any** test for **any** reason but you must meet the following criteria in order to qualify:

- You were present in school and took the test on the day it was originally given. (This is to prevent cheating, be it intentional or unintentional)

- You turned in your study guide on time. (That way, I know you studied the first time.)

- You received a grade lower than the class average (I will let you know the class average when returning tests.)

-You turn in your original test with corrections before retaking the test (no assistance is permitted when making corrections unless it is from me).

- You request and schedule your retake within 36 hours of the test being returned to you.

- Your retake takes place no more than 7 school days after the test was returned.

- You show up to your originally scheduled retake time. (a no-show will remove your ability to retake that test. Two no-shows will remove the ability to retake tests for the remainder of the year).

Test retakes will include the same content, but questions may be scrambled or changed.

Projects – These will be completed in and out of class and will be extended assignments of more than a week (5 School days) in length. Please see the grace day section for some additional information. The no-name policy applies differently on projects. Please consult your rubric for each project for more information.

"Grace Day" Policy

On all projects that extend over a week (5 school days) in length, you will always have one additional day after the due date to turn the assignment in without penalty. This will account for any printer troubles or extenuating circumstances that may have prohibited you from completing your assignment on the original due date. You must email me the assignment [or evidence that is has been completed]

by the time class begins or would begin the following day (even if it is a weekend!). In the case of assignments that are not able to be emailed I require photo evidence that the assignment has been completed. **In order to receive this grace day you must submit your reason to me in writing, explaining exactly why you did not hand it in on the due date and pledging to submit it the following day along with your signature.**

Field Trips

All grades will enjoy a retreat in the spring with costs ranging from \$50 - \$1,000+ (Peru Trip). Only parents or legal guardians are permitted to chaperone school trips.

I expect the same behavior on field trips that I expect in school. All rules apply! You are not permitted to use cell phones on field trip without specific permission from me. If you are using any electronic device without permission, it will be confiscated. The point of a field trip is to learn and being distracted by a screen will prohibit that process. Cameras and cell phones in airplane mode being used as cameras are permitted at appropriate times. Please use your best judgment and be aware of signage that indicates photos are prohibited.

When assigning grades, I follow the grading policy outlined in the Parent-Student Handbook. Projects and essays will be graded with a checklist or rubric. You will always have this ahead of time and I will always explain it to you in class to make sure the expectations are clear. Tests/quizzes will be graded on a simple points system. Questions worth more than one point will be noted on the test. If you ever feel that I have been unfair in my grading, I encourage you to talk to me, but please wait 24 hours after receiving your grade to do so. I will do my best to return any graded items to you within one week. Research papers will be returned within four weeks.

Extra Credit

Extra credit will be given for going above and beyond on projects and occasionally on tests. I will rarely offer individual extra credit assignments. I will never give extra credit to boost a grade at the end of a marking period. You are not eligible to receive extra credit from individual assignments if you are missing any homework.

Class Participation and Attendance

Classwork – This work will be completed in class. You have to do it when it is assigned in class. If you choose to be off task, you will be disciplined and lose points. This category also includes participation during class.

Your attendance to class is very important. 30% of your grade will be in classwork/class participation and I will always have important instructions regarding your homework. Furthermore, you will be tested on the notes I give you in class.

Class participation looks like paying attention during large group instruction, participating with your group during small group instruction, and working diligently on your own work during individual work time. Class participation also looks like completing opening and closing activities during class and completing classwork activities and in-class projects.

Slug Rule: Once in class, you are expected to have the necessary materials, do the work expected, and put forth the effort to get it done. I do not babysit non-producers. If you do not produce and just sit and waste time you will be disciplined using the process outlined above.

Make-up Work

Makeup/Missed work

Please refer to the school policy on illness and the amount of time you have to makeup work. If you have a short term, pre-planned absence (3 or fewer school days), you must be ready to turn in your work the next day you are in class. Please discuss pre-planned absences with me at least one week before you leave so I can provide you with the work you need.

If you miss work, check the designated folder for your class BEFORE you check with me. I likely set aside what you missed. I will always include instructions for completing the work but it is your responsibility to ask me if you need further clarification. Please do this before or after school or <u>after</u> class.

In the event you must make up a test, I will probably send the test home with you. You and your parent must sign the provided form that will attest that you received no aid on the assessment from the internet, your book or any other person. If I am concerned about any dishonesty in this matter, expect to meet with me, a parent and the principal.

If you would like to schedule a time to meet with me to discuss makeup work, please do! I'm happy to help in any way I can. However, if you fail to report to our scheduled makeup time without notice more than twice, I will not reschedule again.

The answer to the question "Did I miss anything?" is always yes. Check with a friend before you check with me. I will gladly provide any missed papers and explain them after class or before or after school. Check the class folder for any handouts you may have missed before asking me.

Contacting Me

Please contact me if you feel the need. My email address is <u>svoran@lccs.cc</u>. Please wait 24 hours before contacting me about any grade. If you are going to be absent for a single day (and know ahead of time) and/or have extenuating circumstance that will cause you to miss an assignment, you must contact me 24 hours (1 Day) in advance to get full credit. <u>Always put your initials in the subject line of</u> any email as well as a few words indicating what the email is regarding. I will not respond to emails

without a subject line indicating what the email is about. Emails sent after 2:30pm will likely not receive a response until the following day. Do not expect a prompt response if you email me before 7:30am or after 2:30pm. If you do wish to meet with me, please contact me to set up an appointment. I will do my best to respond as quickly as possible at other times of day.

Parents, your email addresses are the primary form of communication for us so please give us accurate and updated information. Also, please regularly check your spam folder, especially at the beginning of the year as many email servers direct our messages to you as spam. If you would like to speak on the phone, please email me to set up an appointment. I am not always in my room during the day and I want to be able to connect with you as efficiently as possible.

We will also communicate with your child via their student.lccs.cc email. WE DO NOT COMMUNICATE WITH STUDENTS THROUGH THEIR PERSONAL EMAIL unless they first contact us through that email and even then our response will only be to reply to their email. The Family Portal only allows us to communicate with students via their assigned school email. Students should check their school email at least once daily.

I will be available to most quickly respond to emails between 10:00 and 10:30 during the school day but this is most important for our 4 day students. I recommend that all 4 day students read over the instructions for their assignments early in the day and contact me with any questions immediately. I have a more tightly scheduled afternoon and I will not be able to respond efficiently to questions at other times.
