Course Description

Apologetics focuses on engaging culture using eternal truths. Students will learn why it is important to engage with the culture and how we can do so in a Christ-like manner. Students will be faced with hard cultural topics to discuss such as: immigration, homosexuality, abortion, and more. Students by the end of the class will not only know how to defend their faith, but they will also be able to engage with people who believe differently than themselves and still show the love of God.

Course Goals

Students will grow in their knowledge of basic apologetic terms while seeking to answer should Christians care about their communities and why they should care. Students will begin to understand the biblical reasons for why and how we are to care for this world and the people in it. It will build a biblical base in which students will be able to discuss with others what they believe and why.

Classroom Procedures

Daily Devotional Procedures:

- 1. Enter Class
- 2. Pull out a blank paper or pick up the activity sheet (desk by door will have the activity sheet)

- 4. Begin your Daily Devotional (on the board for each class)

In class procedures:

Coming to attention: Alright! Count down from 5. Needing Assistance: Raise of the hand until called on.

Passing back Papers: All papers will be passed to the back of the classroom to the student closest to my desk. The student will then stand up and put the papers in the turn in bin on my desk.

Class Dismissal:

- 1. Wait for the teacher to dismiss you,
- 2. Pack your things,
- 3. Return any materials or supplies used,
- 4. Leave the class.

Major Assignments

Homework:

Homework will be assigned for each chapter and every homework assignment will be graded for substance and students understanding of the material being taught.

Every assignment done for this class that is turned in needs to have a heading with the following four things:

- 1. Student's Name
- 2. The Date (completed)

- 3. The Class Name
- 4. The Period

Class assignments without the proper heading will have 5 points taken off the total grade. Assignments with no name will be marked as missing, the student will have to claim his paper from the no name board write their name and resubmit the paper.

Assignments that are not completed will be graded as not completed and will be marked down accordingly.

Assignments that are late will be treated in accordance with the Parent/Student handbook. Assignments can all be found on ParentsWeb/Google Classroom. Please let me know ASAP if you are unable to find the lesson plans and assignments on ParentsWeb/Google Classroom.

Assessments:

Quizzes: Quizzes will be given every other week to ensure the understanding of the students.

Tests: There will be 4 tests in total. They will be divided into 1 test per quarter.

Homework: homework will be given to provide a regular form of assessing the students' understanding of the material.

Class work: Class work is used to teach and assess the understanding and comprehension of the material through discussion and group activities, while also teaching social skills in order to spread the gospel.

Papers or Projects: will be used to assess the students' ability to research and create. Papers assist students in their ability to search and find out the answers and allows them to write their findings in an organized manner. Projects assist students in creating something that allows them to deeper understand the meaning or purpose behind what they are learning.

Field Trips

Educational and outreach trips are an integral part of the program that enhance the curriculum. Students must be in good academic and behavioral standing in order to be eligible to participate in school-sponsored field trips. Any student failing at the time of a trip may be ineligible to attend. Students who lose the privilege of participating or who are unable to attend for any reason must report to school as usual.
